Reflections ~ Reflexiones:

GOSPEL: LUKE 1: 39-45

Many artists have painted this moving scene described by Luke in today's gospel. Mary has made a difficult journey through the hill country to be with her relative Elizabeth, who is several months pregnant. The young woman, bearing in her body the Savior, and the older woman, carrying John the Baptist, embrace each other with tears and laughter. Elizabeth recognizes Mary's true identity as "the mother of my Lord." She calls Mary "blessed" three times. Mary is blessed because she trusted that the Lord's words to her would come true.

1.) Mary went to help Elizabeth. Mary then had a happy and joyful experience and was blessed by her cousin. Think of a time when you helped someone. How were you blessed?

2.) Did you recognize some of the words in this reading as part of the Hail Mary?

Leader: Blessed Mary, help us to be more willing to trust the Lord's words to us.

All: Hail Mary, full of grace . . .

EVANGELIO: LUCAS 1: 38-45

Pastor's Message ~ Mensaje del Párroco:

JOY TO THE WORLD

When the prairies of this country were opened up to settlers in the nineteenth century, families who went West and staked a claim on the land lived hard, isolated lives miles away from any neighbors. The husbands did backbreaking farm work to support their families and the wives struggled with child-rearing, cleaning, and cooking in very primitive conditions. When families met the women would fall about each other's necks, embracing tearfully at the joy of being together. This is but an echo of today's Gospel. Luke tells of two women, Mary and Elizabeth, united again after time apart. Each is pregnant and will bear a child who will change the world. What is expressed between them is amazing, overflowing, unconcealed joy. Elizabeth is a woman who has awaited pregnancy for years, and Mary is the one chosen to bear the Messiah. They sense the future unfolding before them, brought about by the hand of God. On this last Sunday of Advent, Mary and Elizabeth remind us that Christmas is not simply about the birth of a child in an obscure corner of the world. It is about recognizing light—the light of Christ, the Anointed One, breaking into the world's darkness and into our hearts.

En este último domingo de Adviento, la historia de María e Isabel nos recuerda que la Navidad no se trata simplemente del nacimiento de un niño en un rincón oscuro del mundo. Se trata más bien de reconocer la luz—la luz de Cristo, el Ungido, que irrumpe en la oscuridad del mundo y viene a nuestro corazón.

A New Order:

This is the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Soon we celebrate anew the fruit of Mary's womb. As we are told in Hebrews, Jesus' new order is being established even today. And as Micah proclaims, his greatness is reaching even now to the ends of the

Important Message from Archbishop Salvatore J. Cordileone Prayer to Stop Assisted Suicide

STOP Assisted Suicide in CA before it's too late! Earlier this year, through a Special Session, the CA legislature passed into law assisted suicide, allowing doctors to prescribe overdoses of medication to terminally-ill patients. Join a coalition of physicians, nurses, disability-rights organizations, and people of all faiths to stand-up for the lives of our elderly and dying and oppose assisted suicide. On Sundays, throughout the rest of this year, referendum petitions will be available for signatures outside of Masses. Signers must be registered to vote and can only sign once.

Why Oppose Assisted Suicide?

- **Sends the Wrong Message:** Legalizing suicide for the terminally ill, while discouraging it for the rest of the population, teaches that the lives of the ill and disabled do not matter to our society.
- **Will Worsen Patient Care:** Patients in other states where assisted suicide has become law are being denied treatment prescribed by their doctors and instead offered drugs for assisted suicide.

Will Increase Non-Terminal Suicide Rates: Suicides skyrocket when assisted suicide is legalized. Oregon's suicide rate for non-terminal people increased 49% after assisted suicide became legal.

Dear Friends and Parishioners of Epiphany:

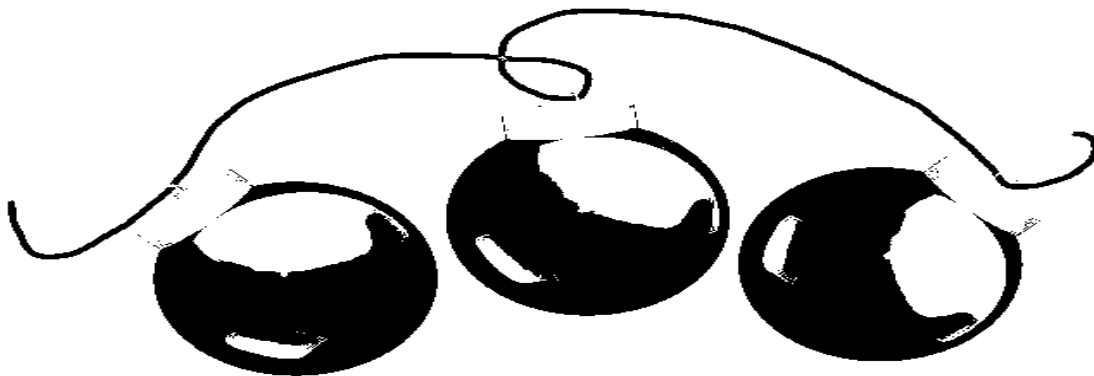
